Overcoming Adversity Through Education

angs, drugs, violence, and thugs; this was the life Whitney M. YOUNG Scholar, Marsha "Lynne" Tinsley was exposed to during her teen years. Lynne's mother, Marsha Tinsley, is grateful for the positive influence the Whitney M. YOUNG Scholars Program® has been in her life and the important role the program played in shaping her daughter's future.

Despite a difficult childhood filled with instability and emotional turmoil, Lynne Tinsley was a straight A student throughout elementary and middle school. One of Marsha's fondest memories is a comment a teacher at Kenwood Elementary wrote on one of Lynne's papers, "One day Lynne is going to be President."

Tragically, Lynne's father died in 1990 when she was eight years old. Marsha tried to raise her as best she could as a single parent in one of West Louisville's most crime infested neighborhoods. In 1995, when Lynne was in the eighth grade at Lassiter Middle School, Marsha was injured in an automobile accident. Her injuries were so severe; she and Lynne were forced to move in with Marsha's parents. It was during this difficult period of adjustment that Lynne began to rebel against authority. The death of her father combined with her mother's injuries caused Lynne to become angry and rebellious. Street gangs such as the "Bloods" began to influence Lynne. Marsha said, "against my wishes, Lynne painted her room red (symbolic color of the "Bloods" gang),

wore red clothing, and had her arm branded. I feared for her safety and prayed for help."

Marsha's prayers were answered when Lynne was accepted into the Lincoln Foundation's Whitney M. YOUNG Scholars Program® while attending Central High School. "Angels stepped in to help my daughter," Marsha stated recalling the overwhelming sense of relief she felt. Marsha made a commitment to the program and ensured that her daughter never missed an Educational Clinic. After becoming a Scholar, Lynne's rebellious behavior and attitude changed. She was exposed to a different, positive peer group of academically talented young people, and began to see that she was headed down the wrong path. Her selfesteem improved and she became more goal oriented. "She wanted to learn and become somebody," said Marsha.

After Lynne graduated from Central High School and the Whitney M. YOUNG Scholars Program® in 2000, she had difficulty

in selecting a college to attend. Marsha recalled a visit from a U.S. Navy recruiter during Lynne's senior year of high school. Marsha shared, "I was totally surprised when Lynne announced she was joining the Navy. Thanks to the Lincoln Foundation Scholars Program, Lynne was exposed to different cultures, places, and people outside her neighborhood. This encouraged her to want to travel and see the world as well as pursue an education while serving her country."

Navy, Lynne stated during a recent telephone conversation, "my best friend died and I just felt that I needed to get away for a while."

Today, Lynne is serving in the U.S. Navy with the rank of E-6, Petty Officer First Class, owns her own home, and is stationed in Norfolk, VA. She was nominated for the Sailor of the Year Award in 2006. When asked about her plans for the future, Lynne said "I'm not sure what I want to major in, but I may take college courses and attend officer training school."

Conquering the **Fashion World**



Benecia Williams once had the desire to become a forensic scientist; instead she is conquering the competitive world of fashion design. Benecia is the

middle child in a family of five and the second in her family to graduate from college. Her parents never finished high school. Benecia is a graduate of the Whitney M. YOUNG Scholars class of 2001 and earned a Bachelor's degree in Fashion Design & Merchandising from Clark Atlanta University in 2006. While at Clark, Benecia had the opportunity to study in London, England. Benecia credits the Lincoln Foundation with encouraging her to read and pointing her in the right direction. During a recent conversation, Benecia said "the Whitney M. YOUNG Scholars Program® staff gave me sincere encouragement and helped me prepare my vision for success and I want to say thank you. This program really works to help young people succeed. I would not have made it without the financial assistance provided by the Lincoln Foundation. Being chosen to study abroad in London, England for fashion design was the most challenging, life-changing, exciting experience one could ask for. I enrolled in classes such as fashion journalism, eveningwear, and fashion styling. The culture, fashion, history, and legacy I inhaled everyday while studying in Europe was confirmation for me that 'this' (becoming a fashion designer) is truly what I want to do and I am willing to take the necessary steps and sacrifices to get there." Benecia has worked in merchandise management positions at Abercrombie & Fitch, Fem Deluxe boutique, and LOOK Magazine. She interned with two publicity firms in Los Angeles, Rogers and Cowan and Team IMAGE, which allowed her to work with talent on the red carpet for the Grammy, Soul Train Music and ESPY Awards. She worked for a well known designer, DeanZign, and has had dresses appear on magazine covers such as Essence. Currently, she is a technical designer with Bon Chic Bon Genre (BCBG) in Los Angeles, CA. Benecia explained, "a technical designer is the middle person between the designer and mass

production. I handle everything in between. I work with the patternmakers and our vendors to ensure the proper construction and fit for a garment. I attend fittings, and do a lot of measuring. I correspond over e-mail a lot to China about the delivery and construction of garments. There is a lot of paperwork as well. Overall, I am responsible for the fit and construction of a garment." Benecia's ultimate career goal is to become a menswear designer. Look for designs by Benecia on the red carpet or coming to a store near you.


I am writing to express my sincere gratitude for your motivation and scholarship. Your dedication has tremendously helped me reach my educational dreams and
